The children were bandaged up and had a ride on the tail lift! We also had an opportunity to look at some of the equipment used. We had great fun and were so well behaved! The way that **maths** is taught in China is respected world-wide and thought of as second-to-none. Over the past few years, here at Ladygrove school, we have implemented strategies to enable our children to have a deep and secure understanding of the maths that they learn - this is known as 'Teaching for Mastery' and has its roots in the Chinese style of teaching maths. Excitingly, this year, Ladygrove school are the leading school for a Shanghai teacher exchange (organised by the Department for Education). Between 9 - 22 November, I will be in Shanghai observing teaching and working alongside Chinese teachers to closely study how maths is taught and how the children learn. Then, at the beginning of March, the Chinese teachers will visit us here - more details will follow nearer the time. Top Tips for Parents- more on reading at home:

Reading is such an important skill -- so important that, without it, children cannot fully access any other subject. At Ladygrove we begin to teach reading using a synthetic phonics scheme called Read, Write, Inc. Children are taught initial single sounds, such as 'k', 'l', 'm'. Children then explore phonemes (sounds) by learning digraphs and trigraphs, such as 'ee', 'ch', 'ng', 'igh'. Throughout all of the phonics teaching children are listening to and sharing books on a regular basis. We firmly believe that children should not just be taught the skill but the will to read. Regular story time and text-based activities occur on a daily basis in our FS and Year 1 classes. From Year 2 onwards, children are taught reading as a whole class. This is because we feel that setting children according to ability caps their potential. Exposing the children to high quality, vocabulary-rich, engaging texts, usually linked to class topics, ensures that the children are getting the most from their reading.

As well as teaching the skills in reading (decoding and comprehension), we work tirelessly as a school to promote reading for pleasure. We want our children to be readers, not just to read because we tell them to. By using online platforms such as Oxford Reading Buddy, by reading outside, by reading with hot chocolate, by taking ownership of our reading areas so that they are places in which children want to read, by engaging in book talk with peers -- by doing all these things we promote reading for pleasure. Above all else, we want our children to enjoy reading.

The most common question teachers get asked is: 'How do I make my child read?' The answer: finding something that will hook your child in is key. You often tell us that you want your children to read the books you enjoyed reading as children. But ask yourself: 'Just because I loved this book, does that mean my child will?' Sometimes children feel that older texts, such as the Enid Blyton series, are no longer relevant to their lives. In that case, they (with your help) will need to find something else, something for them. Remember, not all children will happily sit down with a long chapter book. Reading online, reading comics/magazines, following computer coding manuals are all forms of reading. In our experience non-readers will often prefer books in which there is a mixture of text, pictures, humour, various font sizes -- this is why Diary of a Wimpy Kid and Dork Diaries have such huge fanbases. What we need to remember is that any reading is good reading. If you do feel that your child is 'stuck in reading rut', feel free to ask your child's class teacher for advice on how to widen their reading repertoire, or visit websites such as https://misterbodd.wordpress.com/2019/04/09/reading-forpleasure-tube-map/ for a tube map of alternatives.

The Department for Education is introducing compulsory Relationships Education for primary pupils and Relationships and Sex Education (RSE) for secondary pupils from September 2020. Also, from September 2020 it will be compulsory for all schools to teach Health Education. Schools are required to consult with parents when developing and reviewing their policies for Relationships Education and RSE, which will inform schools' decisions on when and how certain content is covered. Effective consultation gives the space and time for parents to input, ask questions, share concerns and for the school to decide the way forward. Schools will listen to parent's views, and then make a reasonable decision as to how they wish to proceed. What is taught, and how, is ultimately a decision for the school and consultation does not provide a *parental veto on curriculum content*. For more information go to following link:

Reminder: Admissions to school (Academic Year 20/19): If your child was born between 1st September 2015 and 31st August 2016 you must apply for a school place for your child for entry in the academic year September 2020. NB <u>The deadline line date for online applications is 15th January 2020.</u> **Please remember the following:-**

- It is the responsibility of parents/carers to apply for a school place by the deadline of 15 January 2020
- If your child is attending nursery classes within a primary school, you must still apply for a place in the main school
- You can list three different schools in order of preference. We strongly advise you to use all three preferences
- We advise you to enter your catchment (or designated) school as one of your preferences
- Attending your catchment school does not entitle you to free home to school transport if it is not your closest school and / under 2 miles away
 If your application is late, you are far less likely to get a place at one of your preferred schools.

This is a message from the South and Vale Neighbourhood Teams about Halloween.

We will be carrying out high-visibility patrols over Halloween to deal with any incidents of anti –social behaviour. Here's some simple advice to help you have a fun and safe Halloween:

- Young children should never go out trick or treating without being accompanied by an adult.
- Don't knock on the doors of strangers; only go to the houses of people you know.
- Never go into a stranger's house.
- Keep to well-lit areas, wear bright colouring and carry a torch.
- Remember road safety advice.
- Take care not to frighten elderly or vulnerable people.
- If a house is displaying a "no trick or treat" sign please don't knock on the door.
- Children don't be offended if your local shop does not serve you with eggs or flour. We have been working with local stores to discourage their sale to young people.

If at any point you do feel nervous or unsafe:

- Don't open your door if you're unsure who is there. Use your spy-hole, look out of a window, and use your door chain if you decide to open your door.
- Have a contact number of a close relative or good neighbour by your telephone, just in case you need to phone them.
- If you are part of a Neighbourhood Watch Scheme, let your co-ordinator know that you will be on your own at Halloween. If you are a co-ordinator, please identify people in your scheme that may be vulnerable and offer them reassurance.
- Thames Valley Police will not tolerate any anti-social behaviour at any time of the year.

To report anti-social behaviour please call the 24 hour non-emergency number on 101. If it is a crime in progress, call 999 immediately.
